

COLLABORATIVE PROGRAM IN ENVIRONMENTAL STUDIES

Concerning the requirements for Master's degree students registered in the M.G.A. degree program at the Munk School of Global Affairs and in the Environmental Studies Collaborative Program at the School of the Environment.

- **Master's degree (M.G.A.) in Global Affairs**

Master of Global Affairs (M.G.A.) Requirements Coursework Stream (total of 8.0 FCEs):

Master's students who wish to qualify for notation of Environmental Studies Collaborative Program completion at the M.G.A. level must complete a total of 8.0 full-course equivalents (FCEs) as follows:

- 4.0 FCEs core courses in the first year as determined by the M.G.A. degree program requirements;
- 0.5 FCE Internship (GLA 1007H) in the summer session between first and second years, which will also count towards the internship requirement (ENV 4444) in the ES collaborative program, provided it has an environment related component;
- 1.0 FCE *Capstone Seminar* in the second year;
- 2.5 additional FCEs in the second year, which must include the half-credit (0.5 FCE) core course ENV 1001H "*Environmental Decision Making*", plus one half-credit (0.5 FCE) course elective from the approved list of courses at School of the Environment;
- Write a Research Paper on an environment related topic in the home unit that will count towards the ES collaborative program research paper (ENV 5555Y). When registering on ROSI for the research paper project, M.G.A. students shall use one of their home unit designated course codes for that purpose:
GLA 2095H or GLA 2888H. *A copy of the final research paper must be submitted to the School of the Environment prior to convocation.*

Note: *Students who wish to take the School of the Environment core course ENV 1001H in their first year may do so with express permission from the Graduate Chair/Director in the home unit (making a total of 4.5 FCEs in the first year).*

NOTE: The Collaborative Program requirements may be counted as electives towards M.G.A. degree programs requirements in Global Affairs.
